


Goals

- Humane, lawful alternatives for unsheltered residents
- Reduce illegal encampments and trespassing
- Protect rights while addressing community safety

Legal Guardrails

- Martin v. Boise (2018): cannot criminalize if no shelter available
- Lavan v. Los Angeles (2012): property protections
- California Constitution & Civil Rights
- SB 1380 Housing First principles



The 1-2-3 Model

 Option 1: Shelter or Navigation Placement

Option 2: Safe
 Camping & Parking

 Option 3: Voluntary Relocation Assistance





Option 1: Shelter or Navigation Placement





- Individuals who select this option will be transported immediately to the City's Navigation Center or a local partner shelter (St. Mary's Shelter, Pathways, or others).
- Services include 24/7 access to showers, laundry, case management, mental health and housing referrals.
- City-provided transport ensures placement on the spot.



Option 2: Safe Sleeping

 Designated safe sleeping villages with basic services: bathrooms, trash, security. This option is not long-term housing and participants will be connected to outreach and support services from local community-based organizations (CBOs).



Option 3: Voluntary Relocation Assistance

- For those who request travel to family/other cities
- Bus/train fare, food voucher, coordination with destination
- Strictly voluntary, not forced





Operational Process

- Initial Contact Outreach team + SPD
- Notification Individual given written info on 3 options
- Choice & Transport Based on individual selection
- Property Protocol Stored for 90 days if seized

Citywide Plan Elements



- Identify sites (North, Central, South Stockton)
- Staffing: Outreach + SPD
 Community Response Officers
- Funding: Measure M, HHAP, ERF, private partnerships
- Accountability: Monthly council reports

Next Steps

- Site feasibility study
- Legal review
- Draft SOP for staff & SPD
- Funding strategy
- Pilot program launch (6–12 months)
