

PROJECT EVALUATION & SCORING CRITERIA

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SCORING COMMITTEE MEMBERS:

This scoring criteria is designed to provide guidance to City staff in determining which proposal(s) should move forward in the development funding process. Regardless of numerical ranking, the scoring below does not operate to vest in an applicant or project any right to a reservation or commitment of funding. The City will, in all instances, commit gap funding consistent with sound and reasonable judgement, prudent business practices, and the exercise of its inherent discretion. For these reasons, applicants' proposals should be reviewed and scored taking into account both the requirements outlined in the City's Program Guidelines for Affordable Rental Housing and in relation to all other applications in a given NOFA cycle to determine, in the scoring committee's opinion, which proposal(s) are strongest and provide the greatest public benefit.

A: DEVELOPER EXPERIENCE & FINANCIAL CAPACITY (points will be based on the primary/lead developer if co-developer is listed on app)	Max Points	Criteria for Consideration

B: PROFORMA	Max Points	Criteria for Consideration
Applicant's proforma will be evaluated against underwriting metrics and proforma requirements outlined in the City's Program Guidelines for Affordable Rental Housing (e.g., vacancy rate, income/expense inflation, debt service coverage ratio, etc.). Review of project impact relative to any City initiatives or priorities.
