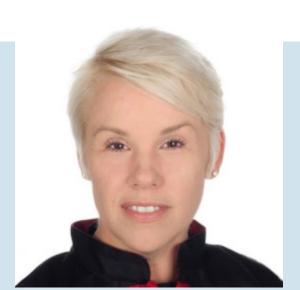

We had a very eventful 2022! Instead of renewing the MMID PBID, the Board made a decision to establish a 501(c)(3) a non-profit organization, the Miracle Mile Community Improvement District (MMCID). This change was made to position the organization to seek grants for the further advancement of the Mile's mission to provide maintenance and security and promote the business and property owners.

Under the leadership of Christopher Callahan, University of the Pacific President, and his wife, Jean Callahan, a Board member, we have expanded our partnership with the University to promote the Mile as a destination for students and staff. We welcomed students to the District during their first week of school with give-aways and music.

Other events held post-pandemic in 2022 included our Candy Crawl and Boo-Tique Market in October and our traditional Sip and Shop after Thanksgiving. Two events that brought families to our District. These events wouldn't have been possible without the countless hours committed by the Promotions Committee. With the receipt of the \$100,000 ARPA grant from the City of Stockton, we look forward to hosting our second annual En Blanc event in June, 2023, as well as our Car Show and Concert.

The biggest news of the year was announced in October. Assemblyman Carlos Villapudua secured a \$20,000,000 grant for the Mile for sidewalk improvements, enhanced crosswalks and lighting, marketing initiatives including creation of a public space at Tuxedo Court and storefront improvements grants for our small businesses. Our Board is looking forward to working with the Assemblyman's office, CalTrans and the City of Stockton to implement these once-in-a-lifetime projects.

I again want to thank our dedicated volunteer Executive Committee, our Board Members and our Executive Director, Kim Byrd. Their commitment and energy has positioned the organization to continue to support the local property and business owners. I am grateful to serve with this group.

The Miracle Mile Property
Based Improvement District
(MMPBID) is a common benefit
assessment district whose main
goal is to provide improvements
and activities which constitute and
convey a special benefit to
assessed parcels.

The Miracle Mile PBID was formed for an initial five (5) year term starting in 2008 and was successfully renewed for two additional five (5) year terms starting in 2013 and 2018. The current five (5) year term expires December 31st, 2022.

cost

The assessment rate (cost to parcel owner) is based on benefit zone, building square footage and parcel square footage. The initial annual rate to each parcel is shown in the table to the right.

Assessment rates will not be subject to an increase over the current term.

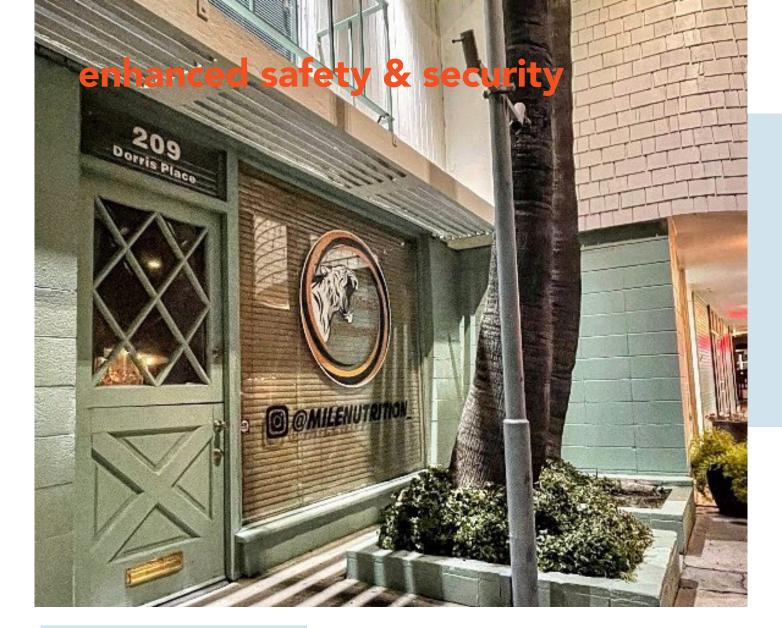
